USS Arleigh Burke 30th Commissioning Anniversary Celebration and Former Crew Reunion – Update and Early Registration Discount

Turning now to our top priority: Planning USS Arleigh Burke's 30th Commissioning Anniversary Celebration and our Association's Former Crew Reunion. The Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the AABF and the NMSN, which lays out the expectations and terms of our relationship, along with our IRS Tax Exempt Status Application, are both with our Lawyer and under review. I expect to have those documents finalized by the end of June, and hopefully the 501(c)3 application submitted to the IRS for processing and approval. Separately, the COVID19 situation has directly impacted the Battleship Iowa as she has had to close her gangway and

LOSS OF A SHIPMATE AND ASSOCIATION MEMBER

Peter Armatis, USS Arleigh Burke's second Navigation Officer and a member of the association, passed away from COVID-19 on April 1. Those who served with him remember him as a great friend and a great officer. Pete was Navigation Officer during the ship's first deployment to the Mediterranean in 1993 and also stood watch as the ASW Evaluator. He spent time after his active duty days working to improve the ship class for those who came after him.

The obituary below appeared in the Fredericksburg Free-Lance Star on April 15, 2020:

Peter Anthony Armatis, 54, born November 11, 1965 in Omaha, Nebraska, passed away from COVID-19 complications on April 1, 2020 at Spotsylvania Regional Medical Center in Fredericksburg, Virginia. Devoted husband of 28 years to Stacy (nee Bazaar);



beloved father of Olivia (21), Jacob (16), and William (14); son of Leo and Monica Armatis of Naples, Florida; brother of Maria (Robert) Armatis-Carnes of Ocean Springs, Mississippi and Rebecca (Jonathan) Armatis-Furr of Chicago, Illinois; adoring uncle to Niclas, Eric, Emily, Jonny, Leo, Hans, and Elsa; loved by his maternal relatives in Sweden. Peter began his childhood in Clinton Township, Michigan and in 1976 moved to Des Moines, Iowa. He graduated from Valley High School in West Des Moines in 1983. After high school Peter enlisted in the Navy and subsequently attended the University of Mississippi where he received a BA in Marketing, participated in Navy ROTC, and was commissioned as a Navy officer in 1989. Peter's years of military service led to service in Operation Desert Storm on the USS San Jacinto, on the USS Arleigh Burke, and as a Flag Aide in New Orleans. Peter was honorably discharged from active duty in 1997 and served several years in the Navy Reserves, including serving time overseas after 9/11. In the civilian world Peter exceled in various professional

capacities working with defense contracting and federal government consulting. His coworkers described him as a dynamic leader, mentor, and motivator who truly cared about everyone. Outside of work, Peter's passions were endless. He had a great appreciation of music, was the DJ of Ole Miss's first Alternative radio station, and had a playlist spanning from Randy Travis to Wilco. An avid outdoorsman and sports enthusiast, he loved Ole Miss football, the Saint Louis Cardinals, the Washington Capitals, and Chelsea FC. He was a lifetime golfer, tactical billiards player, and he would never turn down a glass of fine bourbon or craft beer. In recent years, Peter brought his leadership and passion to Fredericksburg Football Club as a youth soccer coach. Wherever he was and whatever he was doing, Peter loved to connect with people. He was the life of the party and never met a stranger. Most importantly, Peter was a family man. "Family is everything" he would often say. He delighted in his children's successes and loved spending time at home watching British mysteries, playing pool and video games. Peter cherished his time with Jacob on the golf course and coaching Will's team on the soccer pitch. Each year he made time to visit his "Sunshine" Olivia at Ole Miss to eat BBQ and catch a football game. It is difficult to imagine a world without his charisma and big heart. Full military burial and memorial service will be held at Quantico National Cemetery at a later date to be announced.

USS ARLEIGH BURKE COMMENCES THE TRAINING CYCLE BY ENS LUCIUS CAMPBELL AND CDR PATRICK CHAPMAN

Busy few months on USS Arleigh Burke! Since the last newsletter, this ship and its crew have made tremendous strides in the ship's lifecycle.

In January we executed our engineering Light-Off Assessment (LOA), an intensive week-long inspection of our engineering plant, complete with a full-blown main space fire drill. It was a grueling week, but this crew kept a positive attitude and pushed hard — mission accomplished!

From there, we immediately rolled into Dock Trials, Fast Cruise, and Contractor Sea Trials. This was another challenging stretch of time, but the crew rose to the occasion and executed high speed runs, lit off its combat systems equipment, conducted a precision anchorage, streamed its towed array, and tested many capabilities.

In February and March, the ship was in port Norfolk getting emergent repairs done on its fuel tanks. We capitalized on this unplanned in port time by getting ahead on some of our certification events.

Early mornings, late nights, and lots of teamwork enabled us to earn early certifications in Anti-Terrorism, Communications, and Visit Board Search & Seizure warfare areas. As it always does, the crew came together as a single warfighting unit to pass these inspections led by Afloat Training Group (ATG).

In February, our wardroom hosted Capt. (ret.) Rick Easton on board for the first of our Leadership & Legacy Luncheon series. Capt. Easton spoke with our officers about leadership, warfighting, and the power of enthusiasm. It was a memorable luncheon, and we look forward to having him aboard again!

Later that month, we hosted the second in our Leadership & Legacy Luncheon series, this time with Capt. Corey Keniston, former Commanding Officer of USS Arleigh Burke from 2010-2012. This was another fantastic event, and our officers learned about career planning vs. life planning, and discussed complex leadership issues such as conduct and morale.

In March, the COVID-19 pandemic added a layer of complexity to our lives that no one expected. Social distancing became the norm, and we have worked together as a

crew to navigate these uncharted waters.

On the messdecks and in the wardroom, every other seat is taped off to ensure social distancing guidelines are followed. On the mess line, blue tape is spaced out every six feet help crew members keep their distance from each other. Meetings that used to occur in smaller spaces have been relocated. We all wear masks onboard. Social gatherings have been cancelled.

The COVID-19 problem has been a challenging one, but we were determined not to let it get in our way, and we found a way to overcome this obstacle and get back out to sea.

In mid-April, we got underway for TYCOM Sea Trials and our READ-E 5 inspection, a prelude to INSURV. We shot all our guns, conducted an anchor drop test, executed a detect-to-engage sequence with a leer jet, ran the ship at full speed, and received all kinds of material inspections. Our results were not perfect, but they were pretty good. We are proud of the material condition of the oldest (or "saltiest", as we like to say) destroyer in the fleet!

After that inspection, we tested our newest weapons system, SeaRAM. As mentioned in the last article, this was one of our major upgrades from the last ship-yard availability. This test involved a live-fire missile shoot, and our weapons department executed it to perfection! The drone didn't stand a chance. (phot on bottom of page 11)

We remain out to sea and are continuing to march forward on training phase certification events. Since the missile shoot, we have certified in our Aviation and Damage Control warfare areas. We have made great strides in our navigation, seamanship, and engineering warfare areas as well.

We remain out at sea, working hard in this COVID-19 environment to ensure we are ready to go when our nation calls on us. It's great to be out to sea and carrying on the proud legacy forged by the sailors who have gone before us on this mighty warship. We will keep you posted as our story unfolds.

ARLEIGH BURKE was my third ship and the third ship I reported aboard in dry dock. For my next tour as XO, the detailer assigned me to another ship in dry dock. I asked him to reconsider, and he gave me orders to USS KIDD (DDG 993). Turned out we were in two dry docks prior to my first underway on ship's power.

After USS KIDD, I reported to the Ballistic Missile Defense Organization, in the basement of the Pentagon. The second day, my former CO's wife set me up on a blind date. Maggie and I have now been married 24 + years. Several of the pre-comm crew served with her later, believe Boats and EW1, maybe others. (She tells how Boats always made everyone stand when DDG51 was mentioned.)

After the Pentagon, we got orders to Hawaii. I was on PAUL HAMILTON (DDG 60) (PHM) and Maggie on CPF staff. In a break from my four prior ships, we were underway within days of the CoC for RIMPAC 98, fired all ships weapons within the first few weeks, and deployed very quickly thereafter. My first Sea & Anchor, I didn't even know the conning officer's name - fortunately he was very good. We participated in operations Desert Viper and Desert Fox, operated with four different Battle Groups, had four port calls in Australia, then back to Pearl.

Back in Pearl, we joined with Rick for a quick run to Kauai for a BMD test. I remember giving a ball cap to the Kwaj CO. Of course, Army preferred the challenge coin. This was about the time coins were starting to gain popularity in the Navy, so I ordered some on return to Pearl. They just arrived when the Korean J2 visited PHM. I very proudly pulled out the brandnew PHM challenge coin - and you could see all the faces fall. So I also had to pull out ball caps. This was not an improvement, having to give both.

Another round with my detailer - the officer Perspective magazine said volunteering for an overseas tour

was important to your career. So I "volunteered" for somewhere in NATO. This got me a lecture from the detailer - you are going to DC whether you want to or not.

The first year in DC was preparing the CEC Battle-group for OPEVAL and deployment.

After that, I moved to PMS 452 - Navy Theater Wide Program Office. I stated with a small international cooperation program that grew into the SM-3 Blk IIA missile. Shortly after President Bush made missile defense a priority, I became the AEGIS BMD Technical Director, and led deployment of BMD 3.0E and BMD 3.0 with the SM-3 Blk I. For about one blissful year during this period, the program office did not appear on any org chart - amazing what you can get done when no one thinks they are your boss. One of our first ships was PHM, now commanded by Bill Johnson. We would work together again later when he had LAKE ERIE.

I retired in 2005 and worked for the MDA Chief Engineer on a classified program. In 2008 I worked on transition of the SBX from MDA control to the USN (SBX is a freaking huge missile defense radar on a similarly large self-propelled oil platform.)

In 2009, I was hired by Raytheon to work on SM-3. I helped navigate SM-3 BLK IB from final development, initial testing, production, deployment, and eventually multi-year contract. This led to a move to Tucson in 2014. I returned to the IIA program, helping set it up for initial successful intercept test, operational test, and initial production contracts.

In 2017 I retired from Raytheon. We spent nine weeks camping the Rockies in a small travel trailer, and then moved to Annapolis. We currently spend spring and fall in Annapolis, doing some boating. In the heat of the summer we head north, in winter we head south or southwest in our trailer.

USS ARLEIGH BURKE SUCCESSFUL DSRA By Robert Sandoval, Ship Manager NASSCO-Norfolk

On January 31, 2020 NASSCO-Norfolk successfully completed a Drydocking Selected Restricted Availability (DSRA) on the USS Arleigh Burke (DDG-51), delivering much needed warfighting capability to the U.S. Navy. During this availability NASSCO-Norfolk executed more than 263 production work items which included 44 undocking critical work items and an array of critical Ship Alterations.

In addition to the critical work items, NASSCO-Norfolk, with the support of small business teaming partners, managed, executed, and completed a complete hull preservation, 71 tank inspections and repairs, to include 24 blast and preservation tanks, 992 ft² of deck plating removal and replace, and removal and reinstallation of all 580 sonar transducers. Working with our counterparts from the Mid-Atlantic Regional Maintenance Center (MARMC) we were able to identify areas of high risk and mitigate any issues to allow the completion of work on time.

NASSCO-Norfolk, working with the government

Alteration Installation Teams (AITs), supported the extensive install of SeaRAM, an advanced close-in missile defense system which has replaced the Close-In Weapons System (CIWS), and the Surface Electronic Warfare Improvement Program (AN/SLQ-32(V)6 SEWIP Block 2 Upgrade), requiring the overhaul of Radar room number one and electronic workshop number one. These upgrades greatly improved the warfighting capabilities of the USS Arleigh Burke.

The ship departed NASSCO-Norfolk shipyard to Naval Station Norfolk on December 21st, 2019, where she completed all milestones on time including Damage Control Material Assessment (DCMA), Light Off Assessment (LOA), and was three days early for dock trails and subsequent completion of a successful Sea Trails on January 31, 2020. Completing her DSRA on time allowed her to commence Fleet workups to be ready to join the Forward Deployed Naval Forces (FDNF) in Rota, Spain in early 2021.


