FROM THE PRESIDENT

USS Arleigh Burke Association Members, Family and Friends,

Happy New Year! Welcome 2021!!

Well, 2020 certainly turned out to be a lot different than we projected in our February 2020 edition of *The Destroy*erman, thanks to the COVID19 Pandemic!! Despite the many challenges 2020 presented to our Association, the key impact of COVID19 was the delay of our USS Arleigh Burke 30th Commissioning Anniversary Celebration and former Crew Reunion. Originally scheduled over Presidents Day Weekend in February 2021, it is now rescheduled for Columbus Day Weekend 8-11 October 2021. date topped the list of alternatives from our Membership Survey conducted last fall by our Secretary, Mark Fortune.

The USS Arleigh Burke 30th Commissioning Anniversary Celebration Schedule of Events for 8-11 October 2021 is essentially the same as what we originally planned for this month, with one key exception: USS Arleigh Burke will not be in Norfolk to support the Celebration as she sails in the first quarter of 2021 to join the Forward Deployed Naval Forces (FDNF) in Rota, Spain. We are working to virtually include the ship for selected events and I anticipate that Commander Pat Chapman, USS Arleigh Burke's Commander Officer, along with other members of the crew, will virtually join the Official Dinner on Saturday evening 9 October. In addition, I am working with SURFLANT and Fleet Forces Command to support the 30th Celebration with one of USS Arleigh Burke's sister ships, to be at the Half Moon Pier/Nauticus in Downtown Norfolk as Visit Ship for Columbus Day Weekend this year. I am optimistic this will come together as a celebration of both the USS Arleigh Burke 30th Commissioning Anniversary as well as the USS Arleigh Burke Class – the most successful Destroyer Class in modern history.

To help our planning effort, it would be great if those who intend to or anticipate attending the Reunion fill out the Reservation Form – page 15 in this Newsletter below, and return it to our Secretary, Mark Fortune, with your payment by June 1st. Note: June 1st is also the last date for the Package Discount which includes the Welcome Reception, Official Dinner and Sunday Reception – almost a 30% savings. That will really help us work the total numbers and the costs. Note: You can cancel with a full refund up to 15 September 2021. Also, if it turns out that we again cannot hold the event in October, you will get a full refund. If you need lodging, the Marriott is offering a very good deal for our event at \$129/night — link is in the Reservation Form instructions. If you previously had a Marriott reservation for February, it should have transitioned over to the new dates in October, and you should have gotten a new confirmation email from Marriott with your new dates. If you did not get a confirmation from Marriott with your new dates, be sure to contact them. If you have any issues, please do not hesitate to give Mark Fortune or me a call and we can coordinate directly with the Marriott Event Planner assigned to our Reunion to resolve the issue. For those that signed up and paid previously for the February dates, everything has carried forward to the new October 2021 dates.

In addition, our Association Leadership is planning on virtually participating in USS Arleigh Burke's anticipated Fourth of July 2021 actual 30th Birthday Celebration in Rota. The ship's current schedule has her in port Rota on the Fourth. We anticipate a Cake Cutting Ceremony as well as other activities. All Association Members and Friends are more than welcome to participate – the more the better!! Details on joining, to include the virtual link will be published in the June edition of *The Destroyerman*, as well as distributed by Mark Fortune via email immediately ahead of the Fourth.

One final note on the 30th. While I certainly hope it is not the case, if we have to postpone again our contingency plan will be to hold an event in the summer of 2022.

Our Annual Meeting was held on Thursday 22 October 2020 via Teleconference as in past years. I thank everyone who called in for their time and contribution — another excellent Annual Meeting discussion. Following are the highlights which are also captured in Mark Fortune's Annual Meeting Minutes posted on our Association Website:

Your current officers were again reelected for another year. In addition to serving as your President, Rob Jobrack and Mark Fortune continue to serve as your Treasurer and Secretary respectively. We are still looking for "new blood" in leadership positions to help keep the association fresh!!

Rob reported that our bank balance is in good shape with all 2020 taxes and bills paid. Thanks very much to our Members who paid their dues in 2020.

The Membership unanimously voted to continue support for the USS Arleigh Burke Association Anchor Scholarship. Kathleen Ballard was the recipient of the fourth USS Arleigh Burke Association Anchor Scholarship for the 2020-2021 academic year — her third and final award as going forward in her Pharmacy PhD Program at Northeastern University in Boston she is no longer an undergraduate, and thus not eligible per the Anchor Scholarship Foundation rules. You will see Kathleen's note and update on her activities on page 10 in this edition of our Newsletter.

Admiral Arleigh Burke Foundation Way Ahead. In 2020 the Foundation Charter was updated, legal reviews completed, and our application to the IRS for our 501(c)(3) Educational Foundation Tax Exempt Status submitted. In addition, the NMSN Founding Partners Program MOU, defining the relationship between the Admiral Arleigh Burke Foundation and the NMSN, was completed and signed by VADM Morgan and RADM Carr, Co-Chairmen of the Admiral Arleigh Burke Foundation, and RADM Shatynski along with Mr. Jonathan Williams Chairman of the Board and President/CEO of the NMSN respectively. The Association Membership voted to provide \$2000 from the USS Arleigh Burke Association to assist with the Admiral Arleigh Burke Foundation costs in 2021.

In 2021, we will conduct the Association Board of Director and 30th Commissioning Anniversary/
Celebration and Reunion Planning Committee Meetings together from 1930-2015 (7:30-8:15pm) on the third Thursday of every month from January through November 2021. We will hold our Annual Association Membership Meeting on the Fourth Thursday of October 2021. 
Support the Admiral Arleigh Burke Foundation and NMSN activities

ADMIRAL ARLEIGH BURKE

Admiral Arleigh Albert Burke was born on the family farm three miles east of Boulder, Colorado, on October 19, 1901. The first of six children, he was the grandson of Swedish immigrant Anders Bjorkgren who changed the family name to Burke. Young Arleigh never completed high school because of the 1918 flu epidemic but won appointment to the U.S. Naval Academy in 1919. He graduated June 7, 1923, 70th in a class of 412, and married Roberta Bobbie Gorsuch the same day.

After five years in battleship Arizona, Burke was selected for postgraduate education. He earned a Master's degree in Chemical Engineering from the University of Michigan in 1931 and served as a design and production specialist at the Bureau of Ordnance. While he spent only three years on destroyer selector World War II, his first command, USS MUGFORD, won the Destroyer Gunnery Trophy in 1939. His bold and innovative combat tactics as Commander, Destroyer Squadron 23 during the night engagements of Empress Augusta Bay and Cape St. George in the Solomon Islands in November 1943 won him a Navy Cross and Distinguished Service Medal and a permanent place in naval legend as "Thirty-One Knot" Burke. Burke subsequently served as Vice Admiral Marc A. Mitscher's chief of staff in Fast Carrier Force 58/38 during the New Guinea, Marianas, Philippines, Iwo Jima and Okinawa campaigns. After the war, he developed the Navy's first postwar long range plan, helped coordinate the service's testimony before Congress during the 1949 "Admirals Revolt" hearings on defense strategy, and served as the top planner for Commander Naval Forces, Far East and as a member of the first UN Truce Negotiation Team during the first eighteen months of the Korean War.

Rear Admiral Burke was serving as Commander, Destroyer Force, US Atlantic Fleet, when he was appointed by President Dwight Eisenhower in 1955 over 97 senior admirals to become Chief of Naval Operations. He served a record six years. As CNO, Burke fought against increased unification and restriction of room mand authority in the armed forces, and for maintenance of a balanced, fleidble Navo capable of responding quickly and effectively to crises and limited wars. He played a key role in planning military responses to the Suze, Lebanon, Indonesis, Laiwan Stratis, Berlin, and Cuban crises of 1956-1918. Burke also accelerated the development of innovative weapons systems including nuclear powered submarines and surface ships, anti-submarine and anti-air warfare systems and platforms, computers for command and control, and extensive Navy use of space for communications and intelligence. He played the crucial role inside the Navy in championing development of the Polaris submarine-based ballistic missile, deployed in 1960, as a national nuclear deterrent. Burke linked the Navy's nuclear strategy to the need to prepare for limited as well ageneral war. Deeply concerned by the threat of unconventional warfare, Burke initiated development of the Navy SEALs in 1961. His service as CNO heiped insure the U.S. would continue to exploit the strategic advantages of the oceans, and that the Navy could estep is own counsel on budgets, programs and personnel, if not operations. Retiring from the Navy on 1 August 1961, Burke flad addistinguished career on corporate boards, as co-founder of the Center for Strategic and International Studies, and in public service with the USO and the Boy Scouts of America. Arleigh Burke died 1 January 1996 and is buried at the U.S. Naval Academy.



Chief Petty officer Henry graduated from Berenice High School in 1976. He served in the commissioning crew of USS ARLEIGH BURKE in MP Division. His final assignment in the was on USS COLE from 2002 until 2004 as Engineering Senior Enlisted Advisor and Quality Assurance Officer. After retirement he worked for Teague Ford Motor Company and Americable.

Chief Petty Officer Henry was Enlisted Surface Warfare Specialist (ESWS) qualified. During his Navy career, he earned Navy Commendation and Navy Achievement medals, in addition to campaign and command awards.

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ANCHOR SCHOLARSHIP UPDATE BY KATHLEEN BALLARD

Hello Arleigh Burke Association!

My name is Kathleen Ballard and this past summer I was blessed to be selected as the 2020 Arleigh Burke Association sponsored Anchor Scholarship recipient for the third time. Your organization's support has followed me throughout my college career - thank you all so much.

I have arrived upon my final semester of undergraduate college courses - time flies! I trudged on through Zoom classes all of 2020 and will be finishing up my B.S. in Pharmacy Studies this May. After which, I will start my year-long Advanced Pharmacy Practice Experiences (APPEs), completing six, six-week rotations at various hospitals/clinical sites throughout the Greater Boston Area. These experiences are designed to teach us through real-world application of our classroom knowledge in preparation for our licensing exam to become pharmacists. As long as all goes well, I'll be Dr. Kathleen Ballard, PharmD in May 2022!

Currently, in addition to classes I am still working per diem at Brigham & Women's Hospital in the Anticoagulation Management Service department. We manage patients on anticoagulation medications including warfarin, Eliquis, Xarelto, Lovenox, and more. My job is primarily to input patient bloodwork into our medical record system, then call patients to discuss any changes we make to their medication regimen. I've found it very fulfilling to care for patients long-term in this capacity, and it's definitely influenced my decision to pursue a career in ambulatory care in the future.

I started volunteering with a local high school's public health club and administering substance use screenings last semester, as a means of passing forward some support to my community. 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ARLEIGH BURKE CLASS UPDATE BY CAPT SETH MILLER

The DDG 51 Arleigh Burke Destroyer Program sets the Navy standard in shipbuilding by delivering combat system superiority through the AEGIS tradition of Build a Little, Test a Little, Learn a Lot. With its long history of proven capability and success, the DDG 51 Class Shipbuilding Program continues to be at the center of the Navy's plans for current and future mission needs. The following provides highlights regarding DDG 51 Program events since our last update.

The DDG 51 Class Shipbuilding Program has delivered 68 ships to the Fleet to date, with the future USS Daniel Inouye (DDG 118) and the future USS Frank E. Petersen Jr (DDG 121), scheduled for delivery in 2021 by General Dynamics - Bath Iron Works (GD BIW) and Huntington Ingalls Industries (HII) respectively. The DDG 51 program is currently in serial production with 11 ships under construction and a total of 21 under contract, including 14 Flight III ships.

In September, I had the honor of representing our government / industry team at the Commissioning ceremony for USS Delbert D. Black (DDG 119) in Port Canaveral, Florida. As the first ever Master Chief Petty Officer of the Navy (MCPON), Delbert Black oversaw the establishment of the senior enlisted advisor position that eventually became known as Command Master Chief, and he was the first Navy enlisted man to receive the Distinguished Service Medal. MCPON Black's legacy was honored that day by distinguished guests including the Assistant Secretary of the Navy (Research, Development and Acquisition) the Honorable Mr. James Geurts, and Vice Chief of Naval Operations ADM William K. Lescher. MCPON Russell Smith was the Principle Speaker and placed the ship into commission. The Ship's Sponsor, Ms. Ima Black (widow of MCPON Black), closed the ceremony by giving the order to "man our ship and bring her to life".

The DDG 51 Class Shipbuilding Program Office and our shipbuilding partners and industry team continue to operate at a high tempo. The future USS Daniel Inouye (DDG 118) recently completed very successful Builder's Trials in December, with Acceptance Trials planned for February and delivery in March 2021. USS Delbert D. Black (DDG 119) is undergoing CSSQT with Final Contract Trials planned for March followed by her Post Shakedown

Availability in Jacksonville, FL.

The U.S. Navy also recently reached several important milestones for the DDG 51 Arleigh Burke Class Destroyer Flight III upgrade, representing significant progress toward delivering critical Integrated Air and Missile Defense (IAMD) capability to the Fleet. The DDG 51 Flight III upgrade is centered on the AMDR/SPY-6 (V)1 Air and Missile Defense Radar (AMDR) system that provides improved capability over earlier DDG 51 class ships by enabling Flight III ships to simultaneously perform Anti-Air Warfare (AAW) and Ballistic Missile Defense (BMD).

With Flight III ships currently under construction at shipbuilders HII in Pascagoula, MS and GD BIW in Bath, ME, implementing a test program to demonstrate that upgrades can be successfully integrated prior to shipboard activation is fundamental. These efforts are focused on testing the Hull, Mechanical and Electrical (HM&E) equipment required to facilitate the increased power and cooling requirements for the radar as well as integration testing with the Aegis Combat System.

In the Fall of 2020, the Navy achieved light-off of the Flight III electrical plant at the Land-Based Engineering Site (LBES) at the Naval Surface Warfare Center, Philadelphia Division (NSWCPD) in Philadelphia, PA, representing completion of the LBES Flight III HM&E equipment installation and marking the beginning of land-based HM&E system integration testing of the Flight III power system. Concurrent to these efforts the Navy also accepted and installed an AMDR array for land-based testing of the Flight III combat system at the Combat Systems Engineering Development Site (CSEDS) in Moorestown, N.J. This array, along with the rest of the SPY-6 power distribution equipment, will be used for integration testing with the Aegis Combat System.

Maintaining the schedule of the test programs at both engineering sites is critical to successfully integrating these complex components and systems onboard as the future USS Jack H. Lucas (DDG 125), the first Flight III under construction, begins acti-

USS ARLEIGH BURKE SURPASSES BASIC PHASE BY ENS URIAH WOODYARD-FAIR

The engines aren't the only ones going 31 knots on the USS ARLEIGH BURKE! Since the last newsletter, this ship and its crew have faced, and surpassed tremendous challenges in the ship's preparation to homeport shift.

During this quarter, the ship was in the Basic Phase in preparation for our homeport shift to Rota, Spain this upcoming spring season. "During the Basic Phase, a ship is trained, tested, and certified in 23 varied warfare areas including combat roles such as Ballistic Missile Defense and Anti-submarine warfare; to more conventional maritime roles such as navigation, engineering, and the conduct of maintenance. Afloat Training Group Atlantic (ATG) is the training and certification authority for ships on the East Coast".

Kicking off the month of September, the ship began drills for our medical qualification, Fleet Support Operations-Medical (FSO-M). During FSO-M, the ship's crew is placed into a simulated training environment in which, due to some catastrophic event, many sailors suffer injury.

"The goal of the training is for the remaining crew members to respond and assist the small onboard medical team in this mass casualty situation, minimize death and further injury. In order to provide greater realism, the ship's medical team, ATG, and Navy Medical Center Portsmouth (NMCP) came together to create a gruesome scene".

Overall, the evolution was a huge success! The sailors learned many lessons, gained confidence in their life saving skills whether for training or in real life, and enjoyed themselves while doing it.

Rolling into October, the crew completed Surface Warfare Advanced Tactical Training (SWATT), Fleet Synthetic Training — Unit (Completed AW, SW, CRY, Intel, EW), and celebrated the Navy's birthday the best way a warship could- out at sea, driving fast, and leaving salt in our wake.

While the ship completed many major evolutions, one of

the most celebrated on the deck plates was Life Fire With A Purpose (LFWAP/MISSILEX). In the days leading up to the finale of this event, you could hear the crew buzzing with the excitement of witnessing the firing of the SM-2; Then came game day.

Sailors lined up in front of monitors and along the bridge to witness what would be the talk of many underways to come. Inside the Combat Information Center, as the SM-2 fired, you could hear cheering and clapping. The celebration heard could be equated to the joys of watching your team score on Football Sunday. That one moment shared between the crew would serve as a constant reminder of the purpose of our great Navy.

While this quarter brought on many changes, the ship endured one of the biggest changes to close-out the month of October- Change of Command. The sailors, family, and friends witnessed the Change of Command between CAPT Christopher Follin whom passed command to CDR Patrick Chapman.

Despite the challenges COVID-19 pandemic continues to bring, the ceremony proved to be a beautiful one. All guests as well as the special party donned masks while socially distancing as the ceremony was set up pier side with all near-by to witness this special occasion.

Continuing on the great stride to complete Basic Phase, entering November, the crew tackled Forced Protection Exercise (FPEX). Although our ship is one of the oldest ships in the Navy, she will continue to hold down the title of Best in Class by a superb performance in the FPEX Qualification and recognition as one of the best ships thus far to complete it.

With no breaks, the ship rolled into our 3M Certification to further prove our readiness to homeport shift overseas. After a grilling few weeks, the ship proved that despite our age, this ship can still compete with the best of them with an overall score of 93%.

In the final month of the year, the crew would celebrate an anticipated completion of Basic Phase moving us onto the next chapter of preparing to leave Norfolk, Virginia. Currently in the CMAV period, the ship has received MK 59 floating decoys and the Transportable Electronic Warfare Module (TEWM) to increase our electronic warfare capabilities.

While 2020 was an uphill battle, USS ARLEIGH BURKE remains optimistic and continues to build on

the legacy from which we derive. While there has been many cold and rainy days, there is always a rainbow left in the completion of the storm.

In this New Year, we will continue to ensure we are prepared for the time our nation calls upon us to fulfill our purpose as one of fastest and feared warships on the great seas. USS ARLEIGH BURKE and her crew are on the brink of what will be one of her best chapters yet.
