

FROM THE PRESIDENT

USS Arleigh Burke Association Members, Family and Friends,

Unfortunately, and as reported in Mark Fortune's email to our Membership, Family and Friends on August 27th, 2021, due to the recent rise in COVID19 infections throughout the United States, and in particular in the Hampton Roads, Virginia area, it had become highly likely that the Navy would not be able to participate, to include assignment of an Arleigh Burke Class Destroyer for Visit Ship over Columbus Day Weekend Downtown Norfolk at Waterside, and attendance of any Active Duty Sailors at any of the official events to include the Saturday Evening Dinner and Memorial Service for Admiral Burke. Consequently, your Association Board of Directors and the USS Arleigh Burke 30th Commissioning Anniversary Celebration Planning Committee unanimously voted at the Association Board of Directors and Planning Committee Meeting on August 24th, 2021, to postpone for the second time our 30th Commissioning Anniversary Celebration and Former Crew Reunion, and execute our Contingency Plan. Per

that Plan, our USS Arleigh Burke 30th Commissioning Anniversary Celebration and Former Crew Reunion has been moved from Columbus Day Weekend 2021 to

The new dates for what are now our USS Arleigh Burke Combined 30th/31st Commissioning Anniversary Celebration and Former Crew Reunion include: Friday 1 through Tuesday 5 July 2022, with fireworks anticipated on Monday evening July 4th, following a similar timeline to what we did for both the 20th and 25th Commissioning Anniversary Celebrations. Note: Anticipate informal gatherings each evening following completion of the day's Official Schedule of Events in the Marriott Waterside Second Floor Piano Bar

For those whom made payments to Rob Jobrack to attend the 2021 Celebration, he will simply hold your funds for the new dates, unless you would prefer a refund, in which case please drop him a note

at <u>treasurer@arleighburkeassociation.org</u>.

For those that made reservations with the Marriott, your reservation has been automatically moved to reflect the same nights around 1-4 July 2022.

Note: As it has been two years since the previous Marriott Room Rate was established for the Arleigh Burke 30th Room Block, and the current rates for the Fourth of July Weekend 2022 are \$265 Non-Refundable, \$300 Flexible and \$274 Senior, and with a very reasonable expectation the Marriott Waterside will completely sell out that weekend, I had to re-negotiate our Room Block Rate. The best I could do, which is the lest expensive rate the hotel is offering to any Group for that weekend is \$159 / night. While I do understand that this is about a 25% increase in the rate, I do believe that it is an excellent value for the money in the Summer of 2022 at a 5 Star Hotel at Waterside. If it is an issue, please let me know.

Note: If you no longer plan on attending, please contact the Marriott and cancel your reservation.

Note: Our Marriott Room Block is limited, and over half of the rooms are already taken, so if you have any interest in potentially staying at that property, please make your reservation ASAP - you can always cancel within 72 hours. If we need to add rooms at our current Room Block rate, I can only do it if there are rooms available in the Hotel, and they are willing to give us the same or another discounted rate. Making reservations earlier in this situation is beneficial.

Note: If you have any issue with your Marriott Waterside reservation, please let us know and we will work with the Marriott Waterside Event Planner for our Reunion and get it sorted out.

Once the new Weekend Agenda has been finalized, a new Registration Form will be emailed to all so you can update the events you want to participate in. We hope that everyone who was on track for this year's Celebration will still be able to attend in 2022.

The Board unanimously agreed that the only prudent course of action at this juncture, out of consideration for everyone's safety and health, the importance of Navy participation, and the importance of executing a worthy and dignified event, was to delay our 30th Commissioning Anniversary Celebration and Crew Reunion to next year. It remains our goal to have the best USS Arleigh Burke 30th/31st Commissioning Anniversary Celebration and Former Crew Reunion possible!

Admiral Arleigh Burke Foundation/National Museum of the Surface Navy (NMSN)

In May, I traveled with Dave Rosenberg, our USS Arleigh Burke Association and Admiral Arleigh Burke Foundation Official Historian, to Boulder Colorado for the Official Opening of the Broomfield Veteran's Museum (<u>www.broomfieldveterans.org</u>) Admiral Arleigh Burke Exhibit, sponsored by the Admiral Arleigh Burke Chapter of the Military Officers Association of America (MOAA). Dave was the Keynote Speaker at the Exhibit Ribbon Cutting Ceremony. I had the distinct privilege of meeting a number of Admiral Burke's currently living relatives from his hometown of Boulder, as well as the Leadership and many of the Members of the MOAA Boulder Admiral Arleigh Burke Chapter. I presented to both the Burke Family and the Admiral Arleigh Burke MOAA Chapter framed Peter Hsu 20th and 25th USS Arleigh Burke Commissioning Anniversary Drawings on behalf of our Association. CHANCE ENCOUNTER WITH CNO ARLEIGH "THIRTY-ONE KNOT" BURKE

In 1956, as a brand new Ensign (a Mustang from a PO3), I was assigned to the USS Wahkiakum County, LST-1162, at Little Creek, Virginia. Because the LST was at sea, I was housed at a Norfolk Naval Base BOQ Thursday night. Friday evening two Lieutenants (one a doctor) picked me up to drive me to the ship. We learned the Norfolk Tower Officers Club had a great Friday night seafood buffet, and once inside we found a small empty dining room where we could talk in private about the LST and the Captain.

After awhile a small group of men and women in civilian clothes came into the room and took a table on the far side. Also with that group was a officer in dress uniform who came over to our table and commented they observed that I had brand new gold stripes on my uniform. He asked if I was newly commissioned; I answered 'yes' and my assignment was to an LST at Little Creek (the two officers with me were also from the ship).

The Navy officer expressed that one of the gentlemen in the group wanted to meet me specifically, and by the way he is Admiral Arleigh Burke, the CNO of the Navy. The Admiral, dressed in civies, welcomed me as new Ensign into the USN officer corps and noted my initial service as an enlisted man (a Mustang). He took time to talk about my new assignment to an LST and the significance of LSTs to the fleet. Quite a memory because it took place in the Norfolk Officers Club where the two junior officers and I were having dinner in a quiet room – designated for very senior officers only! – but we didn't know that until the uniformed Adjutant with the Admiral's group politely pointed it out!



FAST AND FEARED FOR 30 YEARS

USS ARLEIGH BURKE CELEBRATES HISTORIC MILESTONE

At 0140 on the night of 25 November 1943, five Fletcher class destroyers, known collectively as DESRON 23 and colloquially as the "Little Beavers", made 31 knots towards Cape St. George. They were on a mission to intercept and sink vital Japanese reinforcements transiting south, through the Solomon Islands chain.

From his flagship, USS CHARLES AUSBURNE (DD-570), the squadron commander, CAPT Arleigh Burke stood poised to inflict a fatal blow to the enemy. In the battle that ensued, CAPT Burke's forces unleashed a deadly combination of torpedo salvos and gunfire, resulting in the sinking of three Japanese destroyers. Meanwhile, DESRON 23 remained unscathed.

In recognition, DESRON 23 received a Presidential Unit Citation and Arleigh Burke was awarded a Navy Cross. CAPT Burke would eventually go on to become ADM Burke and serve as the fifteenth Chief of Naval Operations, the crowning achievement of a career defined by courage, innovation, and fighting spirit. These attributes made Arleigh Burke a natural choice as the namesake for the Arleigh Burke class guided missile destroyer. The lead ship of the class, USS ARLEIGH BURKE (DDG 51), was commissioned by ADM Arleigh

Burke and his wife Bobbie on July 4th 1991. During the ceremony, ADM Burke reminded the crew, "This ship was built to fight...you better know how!"

Since then Arleigh Burke class destroyers have formed the backbone of a fleet that is constantly evolving to overcome the challenges of an increasingly complex strategic landscape. From the South China Sea to the Arctic Circle, the silhouette of an Arleigh Burke class destroyer steaming over the horizon serves as a visible reminder of global maritime security and US naval superiority.

The class' durability is matched perhaps only by its versatility. Today, Arleigh Burke class destroyers are deployed across the globe and boast advanced combat systems designed to achieve victory in a high end fight across multiple warfare areas. Whether tracking submarines, launching Tomahawk missiles, or providing air and missile defense, Arleigh Burke class destroyers have proven to be among the US Navy's most capable assets.

After residing in Norfolk, Virginia for nearly 30 years, USS ARLEIGH BURKE (DDG 51) is now forward deployed to Rota, Spain. She joins



USS ROSS (DDG 71), USS PORTER (DDG 78), and USS ROOSEVELT (DDG 80), as part of DESRON 60. On July 4th 2021, she celebrated her 30th birthday.

To commemorate the success of the last three decades, the officers and crew of ARLEIGH BURKE joined together for several events including a gathering at one of Naval Station Rota's oldest establishments, Hay Motivo. Over the years, Hay Motivo has hosted several distinguished visitors, including ADM Arleigh Burke himself on April 25, 1959. In fact, his signature can be found on the wall, along-side other VIP's.

During the event, the ARLEIGH BURKE Wardroom and Chiefs Mess dressed up in summer whites and gathered around Arleigh Burke's bold signature to reflect on the legacy of the Arleigh Burke class and its namesake. (photo on pg. 12)

The celebration continued a few days later as ARLEIGH BURKE hosted over 300 sailors and family members for a command wide picnic at Naval Station Rota's Sea View Pines amphitheater. The festivities included games, raffles, Spanish food and even commemorative Arleigh Burke poker chips courtesy of the Arleigh Burke Association.

There is no end in sight for ARLEIGH BURKE and the rest of her class. Though active for over 30 years, she has been outfitted with the latest technology as the Navy continues to re-invest in this trailblazing ship. Currently, ARLEIGH BURKE is underway on her inaugural patrol as a forward deployed asset in Sixth Fleet. Meanwhile, the US Navy recently awarded the contract for DDG-139, the latest example of ADM Arleigh Burke's enduring legacy.

For those who may remember me, I was an FC2 and the CF03 Workcenter Supervisor during the 2003 deployment. I served on board from October 1999 - October 2004.

After leaving Arleigh Burke, I served as Small Arms Marksmanship Instructor at Recruit Training Command, Great Lakes from January 2005 to October 2007 where I was responsible for the training and qualifications of all Recruits in Basic Training on the 9mm and M500 shotgun.

Following RTC and a quick stint in "C" School, I checked onboard the USS Chafee in Pearl Harbor in April 2008. While onboard Chafee, I served as CSM-MA, CF Division LPO, AT-TRASUP, SAMI, MWR President and FCPOA President. Also, while serving on Chafee I was selected and Advanced to Chief Petty Officer in 2012. Following that selection, I served as CF LCPO and WEPS Dept CPO. I served on Chafee from April 2008 through May 2013 where we conducted 4 deployments to 7th fleet. I assisted in planning and executing multiple missile training shots while serving onboard USS Chafee.

Following Chafee, I began a recruiting tour with NRD Minneapolis, specifically NRS Council Bluffs, Iowa. I

served as station LCPO, and eventually moved up to Officer Processor. While on recruiting duty, I was selected to Senior Chief Petty Officer and Chief Warrant Officer (7160 now 7180). I commissioned as Surface Ordnance Warrant on November 1, 2016.

My first commissioned tour was as Systems Test Officer on USS McFaul. While there I plan and executed the first SM-6 firing using BL4.1 as well as Standard missile firing exercise. During my time on McFaul, I assisted the CSO in guiding CS department and McFaul through multiple training events, real world exercises and a 5th fleet deployment where I directed the Ballistic Missile Defense as the BMD Commander. Also, while on McFaul, I was selected for the Integrated Air and Missile Defense Warfare Tactics Instructor Program.

Currently, I am serving onboard USS George H. W. Bush (CVN-77) as the Fire Control Officer and CS5 Division Officer. My current duties include leading both CS5 and CS7 Divisions as well as leading CSTT Technical Team and somewhat filling the STO billet.

I live in Smithfield, VA with my wife and 4 children at home. I also have 4 children that are out of the house or at college. One of those children was lucky enough to be awarded a 2021 Arleigh Burke Scholarship award.







ARLEIGH BURKE CLASS UPDATE BY CAPT SETH MILLER, PMS400D

The DDG 51 Arleigh Burke Class Destroyer program continues to be at the center of the Navy's plans for current and future mission needs. With the delivery of the future USS Daniel Inouye (DDG 118) in March, the DDG 51 Class Shipbuilding Program has now delivered 69 ships to the Fleet. The future USS Frank E. Petersen Jr (DDG 121) is scheduled to deliver in November by Huntington Ingalls Industries (HII). The DDG 51 program is currently in serial production with 11 ships under construction and a total of 20 under contract, including 14 Flight III ships. The following provides highlights regarding DDG 51 Program events since our last update in February.

The DDG 51 Class Shipbuilding Program Office and our shipbuilding partners and industry team celebrated a number of significant events and milestones over the past eight months. USS Delbert D. Black (DDG 119) completed her Post Shakedown Availability in August at BAE Jacksonville Ship Repair in Jacksonville, FL. A formal Ship Custody Transfer ceremony was held on September 9 to commemorate the transfer of custody from new construction (PMS 400D) to in-service sustainment (PMS 443). The future USS Frank E. Petersen Jr (DDG 121) completed very successful Builder's Trials in August and Acceptance Trials in September. The future USS Carl Levin (DDG 120) achieved Aegis Lightoff (ALO) at General Dynamics - Bath Iron Works (GD-BIW) in June, and will be christened on October 2. The keel for the future USS Harvey C. Barnum Jr (DDG 124) was ceremoniously laid down on April 6 at GD-BIW.

In April, I had the honor of representing our Program Executive Office, Ships (PEO Ships) at the Christening ceremony for the future USS Lenah Sutcliffe Higbee (DDG 123) at HII in Pascagoula, Mississippi. As the first female recipient of the Navy Cross, Mrs. Higbee joined the Navy in October 1908 as part of the newly established Navy Nurse Corps, and later went on to become the second superintendent of the Navy Nurse Corps. Mrs. Higbee's legacy was honored that day by distinguished guests including the Honorable Mr. Jay Stefany, Assistant Secretary of the Navy (Research, Development and Acquisition (Acting)) and Chief of Naval Operations representative RADM Cynthia Kuehner, Commander, Naval Medical Forces Support Command. Former Secretary of the Navy Ray Mabus was the Principal Speaker and the Ship's Sponsors, Louisa Dixon, Virginia Munford, and

Pickett Wilson, closed the ceremony with the traditional bottle breaking.

The U.S. Navy also recently reached several important milestones for the DDG 51 Arleigh Burke Class Destroyer Flight III upgrade, representing significant progress toward delivering critical capability to the Fleet. The Flight III destroyers are centered on the AN/SPY-6(V)1 Air and Missile Defense Radar (AMDR) and will provide cutting edge Integrated Air and Missile Defense (IAMD) capability to include significantly greater detection range and tracking capacity. The first Flight III Destroyer, the future USS Jack H. Lucas (DDG 125), was successfully launched on June 5 at HII. The ship is over 65% complete with ALO planned for December. There are now five Flight III ships under construction at both shipyards.

Land-based integration testing of the Flight III electric plant and combat systems infrastructure is ongoing. These efforts are focused on testing the Hull, Mechanical and Electrical (HM&E) equipment that will facilitate the increased power and cooling requirements for the radar as well as integration testing with the Aegis Combat System. To mitigate risks prior to shipboard activation, the Land Based Engineering Site (LBES) began Electric Plant remote cold testing via MCS in August and will begin Electric Plant Remote testing in the Fall. The SPY-6 AMDR radar at the Combat Systems Engineering Development Site (CSEDS) in Moorestown, N.J successfully radiated in June and integration testing with the Aegis Combat system is on track. These land based testing efforts are burning down risk in support of shipboard activation milestones on the critical path to sea trials and delivery, including Aegis Lightoff (ALO) and main engine lightoff (MELO).

Maintaining the schedule of the test programs at both engineering sites is critical to successfully integrating these complex components and systems onboard as the future USS Jack H. Lucas (DDG 125) begins activation and test. The program remains on track to deliver this tremendous capability to the Fleet. Completion of these most recent milestones is a significant accomplishment and is a testament to the hard work and dedication of the Flight III team.
