FROM THE PRESIDENT

Welcome 2024!! The Holidays whizzed by for me this year and things are already off to a rapid start. It is



great to have our new Secretary, Corey Keniston, in place pursuant to his Election at the October 2023 Annual Membership Meeting, taking over from Kenyon Hiser who had been our Acting Secretary since Mark Fortune stepped down at the beginning of 2023. Of most importance this year is our plan is to stand up sometime this coming Summer the USS Arleigh Burke 35th Commissioning Anniversary Celebration Planning Committee, as the Fourth of July 2024 marks the two-year countdown to that historic milestone in the Admiral's Destroyer's life!

But before I get too much farther, I am very sad to report that we lost **Jeff Pitel**, Arleigh Burke's Commissioning Systems Test Officer (STO), on December 12th 2023, after a two-year battle with liver disease. Rob Jobrack, our Association Treasurer, extended sincere condolences to his widow, Ellen, on behalf of the entire Association. Jeff was the consum-

mate "STO" and made a huge difference in the introduction of USS Arleigh Burke and the Arleigh Burke Class, contributing directly to the highly successful Class Operational Evaluation (OPEVAL), key amongst many things. He was an important part of the Commissioning Crew. We will miss Jeff's enthusiasm and dry sense of humor!

All reports indicate that **USS Arleigh** Burke, under the leadership of her Captain, Commander Ty Bowman, continues to do great things as part of the Sixth Fleet Forward Deployed Naval Force. With the October 2023 Hamas attack on Israeli Civilians and resulting Gaza War, coupled with the ongoing Ukrainian War with Russia, there are now two serious conflicts bordering on the Sixth Fleet Area of Responsibility (AOR). Despite being the first in Class and over 32 years old, the Admiral's Destroyer is fully modernized with her combat system having been upgraded to Baseline 9, and at the peak of material readiness due to the outstanding stewardship of her Crew. We can all be very proud that our Destroyer is contributing directly to security on the front lines of what is an increasingly unstable world.



35th Commissioning Anniversary Celebration Planning Committee. As mentioned previously, we will be standing up this Summer the 35th USS Arleigh Burke Commissioning Anniversary Celebration Planning Committee. We are looking for input on both content and format from all our Association Members, Families and Friends. And, we are looking for Volun-

teers to make it all happen. If you are willing to contribute to this historic Ceremony, please let our Secretary, Corey Keniston, know.

Oral Histories. As addresses in previous Newsletters, we are very interested in input from the Association Membership, to include Families and Friends, on worthy stories or artifacts that contribute to USS Arleigh Burke's noteworthy Fleet Introduction and Service History, as well as thoughts you may have regarding individuals you recommend be included on the Oral History Interview list. As stated previously, this is important work to capture those pearls of historical knowledge before they are lost due to the passage of time. Also, we are looking for volunteers to help with conducting the Oral History Interviews. Please let Kenyon and me know if you can help here.

Missing Roger Williams USS Arleigh Burke Commissioning Painting. Tracking down the Roger Williams missing USS Arleigh Burke Commissioning Painting still continues. We believe we have the period that it disappeared narrowed to a 2 year window – likely between 2002 to 2004. We remain hopeful that it was removed for safekeeping during an availability or for some other reason, and we just need to get to the person who has it so it can be returned. Again, all we want is the Painting back as it is an important historical artifact of both Admiral Arleigh Burke and USS Arleigh Burke.

Anchor Scholarship. We are on track to support award of the 2024-2025 Academic Year USS Arleigh Burke Association Anchor Scholarship which will occur in June of this year. This will be our Association's Eighth Anchor Scholarship. Our Treasurer will provide the funds to the Anchor Scholarship Foundation in February. My sincere appreciation to all the Association Members who contributed in 2023 to make our Eighth Scholarship a reality. Well done!! Please see Rob's section for details.

National Museum of the Surface Navy (NMSN)/ Surface Navy Association Annual Symposium 9-11 January 2024. We are down now less than two years to the Official Opening of Phase One of the NMSN – 13 October 2025, aboard the Battleship Iowa, in the Port of Los Angeles. Design effort has now passed to the Detailed Designers – Phil Bloom and Joshua Wexler. Included in the Plan is an Aegis Showcase/Exhibit. David Rosenberg and I met with Phil and Joshua in December

2023, and we are standing by to support. The Aegis Exhibit will be a highly interactive immersive Experience. It is very exciting and will be a great place to memorialize Admiral Arleigh Burke. As mentioned in previous Newsletters, the key theme for our Surface Warrior Museum is "Freedom of the Seas" and its importance to both our National Security and Prosperity. In addition, during the recent Surface Navy Association Annual National Symposium in Crystal City/Arlington, Virginia 9-11 January 2024, the NMSN had a Kisok. We signed up several hundred new NMSN Plank Owners, and I also had the chance to interact with a number of former Arleigh Burke Sailors — two highlighted here: VADM John Nowell and LT Ashley Mack.

My duties involved test equipment calibration and repair. I also had the privilege to serve as the only First Class CSOOW underway and in port.

After leaving the Navy's finest destroyer, I reported to duty at Fleet Training Center, Norfolk. There I was the course supervisor for Test Equipment repair and calibration. As I finished my duties there, we packed up all of the equipment and training materials and the course was moved. Prior to that date, I decided that I would not be re-enlisting. Once my enlistment was up, I moved back to my hometown of Lebanon, PA.

I was able to land a job doing what I loved, Test Equipment repair and calibration, imagine that. That had me traveling all over Pennsylvania to hospitals because we specialized in Biomedical test equipment. 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USS ARLEIGH BURKE (DDG 51) PATROL 4 UPDATE

For the Arleigh Burke-class guided-missile destroyer USS Arleigh Burke (DDG 51), the New Year brought an opportunity for reflection on the first month of her fourth Forward Deployed Naval Forces-Europe patrol.

Arleigh Burke departed Rota, Spain, on November 17th, 2023 after completing a comprehensive Surface Incremental Availability (SIA). 17.5 million dollars of repairs, alterations, and installations were performed to the ship's engineering, weapons, and combat systems, and the intensive Mobility-Engineering (MOB-E) certification was completed.

The ship began her patrol transiting east through the Straits of Gibraltar. In this area, she participated in the 2023 European Air-Missile Defense Exercise 2023 (EAMDEX23), a joint exercise incorporating the United States Air Force, Army, and Space Force together with AEGIS Ashore Poland and Romania and NATO allies.

In the Mediterranean, Arleigh Burke joined the Gerald R. Ford Carrier Strike Group (CSG). She joined the ranks of the Gerald R. Ford (CVN 78), Carrier Air Wing (CVW) 8, Destroyer Squadron (DESRON) 2, the Ticonderogaclass guided-missile cruiser USS Normandy (CG 60), and Arleigh Burke-class guided-missile destroyers USS Ramage (DDG 61), USS McFaul (DDG 74), and USS Thomas Hudner (DDG 116). While a part of the Gerald

R. Ford Carrier Strike Group (GRFCSG), Arleigh Burke served as horizon reference unit and air defense picket, participated in flight operations, and conducted fleet level tactical exercises.

On December 10th 2023 Arleigh Burke took her first port call in Souda Bay, Crete. Her visit in Souda Bay provided a chance to further strengthen the United States' partnership with its NATO ally Greece, demonstrating the U.S.'s commitment to a stable, secure, and prosperous Europe. Additionally, Arleigh Burke Sailors enjoyed the opportunity to experience the unique aspects of Grecian culture. While in port, Arleigh Burke's Visit, Board, Search, and Seizure team collaborated with Greek Navy Seals to complete her theater-level certification.

Following her port visit, Arleigh Burke performed escort duties with the USS Mount Whitney (LCC 20) as she sailed westward through the Mediterranean.

Arleigh Burke arrived back in Rota on December 21st 2023, marking the end of 30 days underway. During the first portion of her fourth FDNF-E patrol, she traveled 6,500 nautical miles and conducted 4 sea and anchor details, 4 underway replenishments, and 27 helicopter flight operations.

Following her return to homeport, Arleigh Burke commenced an inter-patrol Training and Maintenance Availability (TRAV). During the in-port period, Arleigh Burke conducted routine repairs and maintenance in preparation for her second half of patrol. After saying farewell to outgoing Shipmates and welcoming new faces, she departed Rota, Spain on January 5th, 2024.

Reflecting on the first half of patrol, CDR Bowman, Commanding Officer of the USS Arleigh Burke remarked, "The crew of the Admiral's Destroyer continues to display remarkable ingenuity and technical acumen in a theater with complex and dynamic threats. Their efforts continue to solidify her legacy as first-inclass of the most successful class of warfighting ships in history. She is America's Lead Destroyer!"

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Arleigh Burke is currently on a scheduled patrol in the U.S. Naval Forces Europe area of operations, employed by U.S. Sixth Fleet to defend U.S., allied and partner interests.

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ARLEIGH BURKE CLASS UPDATE

Calendar Year 2023 was an eventful and positive year for the DDG 51 Arleigh Burke-class Destroyer program. The capstone event of 2023 was delivering the first Flight III ship, the USS Jack H. Lucas (DDG 125), on 27 June 2023. Following a post-delivery availability and crew training period, DDG 125 sailed away from Huntington Ingalls Industries (HII), Ingalls Shipbuilding Pascagoula, MS shipyard on 26 September. During transit to Tampa, FL, DDG 125 conducted her first Live Fire Exercise of a SM-2 missile, resulting in the skin-to-skin intercept of her intended target. DDG 125's commissioning ceremony was held in Tampa, FL on 07 October 2023. The ship arrived in her homeport of San Diego, CA on 25 October 2023 to continue testing and proving the new combat systems.

Equally compelling was the award of multi-year procurement contracts for Fiscal Years 2023 through 2027 on 01 August 2023. HII and General Dynamics Bath Iron Works (BIW) were awarded separate, fixed-price incentive contracts for the construction of nine firm ships (six at HII, three at BIW). The third ship authorized and appropriated in FY23 was awarded as a pre-priced Option ship to HII on 11 August, bringing the total number of ships on contract to 26 through FY27. This FY23 – 27 MYP award provides HII and BIW with a stable workload that will ensure the successful acquisition, production, and delivery of these vital platforms to the warfighter for decades to come.

With the delivery of USS Carl M. Levin (DDG 120) in January 2023 and USS Jack H. Lucas (DDG 125) in June 2023, 73 DDG 51-class ships have been delivered to the Fleet. The future USS John Basilone (DDG 122) is currently preparing for trials and will be the next ship to deliver in 2024. The future USS Harvey C. Barnum, Jr (DDG 124) recently achieved Aegis Light Off (ALO) on 04 January 2024. This milestone marks the beginning of

the ship's combat systems test program that will culminate in her readiness for Builder's Trials, Acceptance Trials, and eventual delivery to the Fleet in late 2024.

The Navy accomplished many other significant milestones in the past year and continues to work with our industry partners to accelerate delivery of this critical capability to the Fleet. Since the program's last update in February 2023, the Navy celebrated the following set of achievements:

In addition to these shipbuilding milestones, Secretary of the Navy Carlos Del Toro recently named DDG 141 (future USS Ernest E. Evans) and DDG 142 (future USS Charles J. French). DDG 141 is named after Medal of Honor recipient Commander Ernest Edwin Evans. Secretary Del Toro made the announcement of the future USS Ernest E. Evans during a Native American Heritage month event held at the U. S. Naval Academy

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on 15 November 2023. Commander Evans was posthumously awarded the Medal of Honor for his heroic actions during the Battle of Leyte Gulf in World War II. Commander Evans is the first Native American in the U. S. Navy to be awarded the Medal of Honor.

The most recently named ship, DDG 142, is named after Navy Mess Specialist 1st Class Petty Officer Charles Jackson French. Petty Officer French saved 15 of his shipmates after their high-speed transport was sunk in combat during the Battle of Guadalcanal in World War II. Secretary Del Toro posthumously elevated Petty Officer French's personal letter of commendation from Admiral Halsey and awarded him the Navy and Marine Corps Medal in May 2022 in recognition of Petty Officer French's heroic actions. I had the honor to be in attendance when the Secretary surprised the audience at the

Surface Navy Association's 36th Annual National Symposium on 10 January 2024 by announcing the naming.

On 11 December 2023, the Naval War College hosted a keel plate ceremony for the future USS J. William Middendorf (DDG 138). This ceremony was held to honor Ambassador Middendorf, the ship's namesake, prior to commencing ship construction. Ambassador Middendorf served as Secretary of the Navy from 1974 to 1977 and as a United States Ambassador on three occasions, including to the Netherlands (1969 – 1973), to the Organization of American States (1981 – 1985), and to the European Union (1985 – 1987).

The DDG 51 program continues to deliver highly capable warships ready to "preserve the peace, respond in crisis, and win decisively in war."

ADMIRAL BURKE AT THE TEXACO STATION FROM OUR FIRST ORAL HISTORY INTERVIEW INTERVIEW OF CAPT JOHN INGRAM

"So I graduated from high school in 1975. And I grew up in the D.C. area. When I was a sophomore, I worked at a place called Westwood, Texaco in Bethesda, Maryland. I worked in a gas station, pumping gas, checking oil cleaning windshields.

And Arleigh Burke would drive into Westwood, Texaco now and then and the manager of the station would like go hermatile. The admiral's here. Get out there. Wash his windows. You know, and so I would pump Arleigh Burke's gas and wash the windows, check the oil. And I told him I wanted to be in the Navy. And he graciously spent a little bit of time talking to 15-year-old me about how great a Navy career would be.

He was, I think a member the board, the governing board of Texaco at that point, which is why they knew who he was. And he comes in and pull out all the stops and make sure that he's happy and get his gas pumped."

You know, if you do something the right way and you have success, even if it was hard, it's something that you should keep in mind. You know, this is what it takes. These are the kind of things that you have to do to ensure success."
